

Dice 0 to 100: Rapid Write Edi- tion

SCAN TO SEE IT PLAYED



Roll doubles, grab the pen, and race to write your way to 100!

The core game

How it works

- 1 Split into clusters of 4 or 5 players, each cluster shares two six-sided dice, a pen, and a sheet of paper with everyone's name on it
- 2 On 'Go', all players simultaneously roll their pair of dice as fast as they can
- 3 The moment a player rolls doubles, they shout 'Double!', grab the pen, and start writing numbers from where they left off — starting at 1
- 4 As soon as another player rolls doubles, they take the pen and continue writing their own sequence — the first person to write 100 beneath their name wins

Ways to play

Two versions for every occasion

Way 1 — Classic Rapid Write

Best for 4–5 players · Classroom or party table

- Each player writes their name at the top of a shared sheet of paper
- Everyone starts rolling their pair of dice simultaneously on 'Go'
- Shout 'Double!' the moment you roll matching numbers and grab the pen
- Write numbers in sequence starting from 1 — you must stop the instant someone else rolls doubles and claims the pen
- First player to write 100 beneath their name wins the round

Way 2 — Family Table Version

Best for 2–4 players · Kitchen table at home

- Each player gets their own piece of paper and writes their name at the top
- Share one pair of dice, taking turns rolling as fast as possible
- When you roll doubles, write as many numbers as you can before your turn ends (set a 5-second timer)
- Pass the dice and keep rolling in rotation
- First to reach 100 wins — try to beat your personal best each round!

TIP FOR PARENTS

Try this at home

Let younger children write larger numbers in bigger handwriting — the goal is the excitement of the race, not perfect penmanship. You can also lower the target from 100 to 50 for a quicker game with little ones.

THE SCIENCE OF PLAY

Why it works

The combination of luck, speed, and quick number recognition keeps all players constantly engaged — nobody sits out waiting for their turn. The unpredictable moment when the pen changes hands creates genuine suspense and teaches kids to handle both winning and losing gracefully.
